





Ethnomedicine — the study of traditional medicines of different people — researches all preventive, hygenic and therapeutic procedures coming from the 3 natural realms.



Human abilities to heal refer historically to the habitat, adopting different therapeutic strategies following climate pedologic, fitogrographic, fauna characters as well as cultural and socio structural elements.



Evolving from an original historic – ethnographic interest towards lab research, the discipline involves biomedicine and pharmacology, thanks to World Health Organization.

WHO's Traditional Medicine Program Is created as an answer to renewed interest towards traditional therapies and their interaction within the national health service.



1. Tradition! Medicine



- 1. In some Asian and African countries, 80% of the population depend on traditional medicine for primary health care.
- 2. Herbal medicines are the most lucrative form of traditional medicine, generating billions of dollars in revenue.
- 3. Traditional medicine can treat various infectious and chronic conditions: new antimalarial drugs were developed from the discovery and isolation of artemisinin from Artemisia annua L., a plant used in China for almost 2000 years.
- 4. More than 100 countries have regulations for herbal medicines.

Traditional medicine is the sum total of knowledge, skills and practices based on the theories, beliefs and experiences indigenous to different cultures that are used to maintain health, as well as to prevent, diagnose, improve or treat physical and mental illnesses.

Annual revenues in Western Europe reached US\$ 5 billion in 2003-2004. In China sales of products totaled US\$ 14 billion in 2005. Herbal medicine revenue in Brazil was US\$ 160 million in 2007 (WHO, 2010)

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

In the porches towards the temple was located the *abaton*, hospitalization and sleep area, where patients spent their nights immersed in a hatched sleep


In the sacred enclosure was a *thòlos*, a circular labyrinth with a sacred well, home od the sacred serpents where the sick would leave votive tablets with their stories, symptoms and treatments received.




Epidaurus

The first greek clinical case documented by the patient. The whole life of the greek orator Aelius Aristides turnes around a mutant psychic case and around Asclepio, the god healer.



Psychic "surgery" is a type of non-surgery performed by a nonmedical healer. The healer fakes an incision by running a finger along the patient's body, apparently going through the skin without using any surgical instruments. The healer pretends to dig his hands into the patient's innards and pretends to pull out 'tumors'. Using trickery, the healer squirts animal blood from a hand-held balloon while discarding items such as chicken livers and hearts. The patient then goes home to die, if he or she was really dying, or to live if there was nothing seriously wrong in the first place.

Psychic "surgery" is big business around the world, but especially in the Philippines and Brazil, where "healers" like Alex Orbito and Laurence Cacteng ply their trade. Tony Agpaoa put psychic "surgery" on the map in Manila, where there are now several hundred practicing psychic "surgeons", many working out of hotels. In 1967, Agpaoa was indicted for fraud in the United States. He jumped bail and went home, forfeiting a \$25,000 bond.



In 1961 Dr. Henry Beecher reported on a study in which he divided patients scheduled for heart surgery for treatment of angina pectoris into two groups. One group had the full surgery. The other was cut open and simply sewn back up. Both groups were told they had the full operation. Follow-up studies indicated that all the patients fared equally well and so it was shown that surgery for angina pectoris was a placebo.






Figure 6. Simplified visualization of the persistence homological scaffolds. The persistence homological scaffolds \mathcal{H}_{pla}^{p} (a) and \mathcal{H}_{psi}^{p} (b) are shown for comparison. For ease of visualization, only the links heavier than 80 (the weight at which the distributions in figure 5a bifurcate) are shown. This value is slightly smaller than the bifurcation point of the weights distributions in figure 5a. In both networks, colours represent communities obtained by modularity [49] optimization on the placebo persistence scaffold using the Louvain method [50] and are used to show the departure of the psilocybin connectivity structure from the placebo baseline. The width of the links is proportional to their weight and the size of the nodes is proportional to their strength. Note that the proportion of heavy links between communities is much higher (and very different) in the psilocybin group, suggesting greater integration. A labelled version of the two scaffolds is available as GEXF graph files as the electronic supplementary material. (Online version in colour.)
